Municipal Candidate Filing

GENERAL MUNICIPAL ELECTION April 5th, 2016

First day of filing for candidacy for the April 5th, 2016 General Municipal Election for the City of Weldon Spring begins at 8:00 A.M. on Tuesday, December 15th, 2015 and closes at 4:00 P.M. on that day only. Filing continues Monday through Friday during normal City Hall office hours (Monday through Friday between the hours of 9:00 A.M. and 4:00 P.M.) The last day to file as a candidate for this election will be January 19th, 2016. City Hall will be open on that day from 9:00 A.M. until 5:00 P.M.

The following positions are up for election on April 5th, 2016:

Alderman – Ward I – a term of two years

Alderman – Ward II – a term of two years (and)

Alderman – Ward III – a term of two years

Qualifications:

For Mayor: A candidate must be at least twenty-five (25) years of age, a citizen of the United States and an inhabitant and resident of the City for at least one (1) year preceding the election.

For Alderman: A candidate must be at least eighteen (18) years of age, a citizen of the United States and an inhabitant and resident of the City for one year preceding the election.

RSMo 115-346: *Notwithstanding any other provisions of law to the contrary, no person shall be certified as a candidate for a municipal office, nor shall such person's name appear on the ballot as a candidate for such office who shall be in arrears for any unpaid State Income Taxes, Real Property Taxes, Personal Property Taxes or City taxes or municipal user fees or if the person is a past or present corporate officer of any fee office that owes any taxes to the State on the last day to file a declaration of candidacy for the office.*

RSMo 115.348: *No person shall qualify as a candidate for elective public office in the State of Missouri who has been convicted of or found guilty of or plead guilty to a felony or misdemeanor under federal laws of the United States of America.*

Clean Water is Essential for a Clean Environment

Fall is here and winter will soon be upon us. Please be aware of some seasonal things you can do to help improve the water quality within the City waterways:

1. Dispose of gathered leaves, pet waste, chemicals, paints and other debris responsibly with your waste collector.
2. If needed, use fertilizers and pesticides per the manufacturers recommendations.
3. Use deicing chemicals and salt sparingly and only when needed.
4. Do some fall plantings of trees, shrubs or ornamentals to increase the green space on your property. Seasonal tree trimming and proper disposal of the branches should be done now.
5. If you have a septic tank and have not checked it recently you should check it before winter when service and access may be a problem.

Making a few changes in our daily lives can significantly reduce the amount of pollutants we contribute to storm water runoff. As always, if you see any suspicious dumping of any liquids or debris into the storm sewers, drainage ways or waterways within the City of Weldon Spring, please report/contact the City. John Weldon Only Had One Spring . . .

As previously, in past city newsletters, John Weldon's land is currently occupied by the Emmanuel United Church of Christ up on the hill near Highway 94 and I-64 and the spring which attracted Weldon to the area is still flowing today.....



In the early 1800's, a cog mill was built, powered by water from the spring. A blacksmith shop, gun shop and grist mill were soon added. Frederick Bunding built a general store and later added a shoemaker's shop. He served as the village postmaster for 50 years. Some of his neighbors were the old post office, the Mergenthal Blacksmith Shop and the old Stage Line and hotel for travelers.

Except for a brief period when this area was deeded to Spain, the territory remained under French control until acquired by the United States in 1803 as part of the Louisiana Purchase. In 1821, Missouri became a state. The first state capitol was located in St. Charles, Missouri.

In 1824, Gottfried Duden, a Prussian lawyer, visited this area in Missouri. He was in search of land tracts for German settlements. Both Duden and his traveling companion, Ludwig Eversmann, purchased farms about fifty miles west of St. Louis in what is now Dutzow, Mo. Spending nearly a year in this area, he spent a total of three years in all visiting the United States. Duden enjoyed reading, exploring the country, and writing letters while the Americans that he hired cleared his land and ran his farm. Duden then returned to Germany in 1827.

His favorable impressions of the area were recorded and later published in a book in Germany. After an uprising led by students of Heidelberg University was suppressed by Prussian soldiers in 1830, many Germans decided to emigrate to the U.S. This, and the likely influence of Duden's book, resulted in an influx of industrious German settlers to St Charles County and the Weldon Spring area. Duden's book was one of a large number of German books about America, but his was one of the most widely read. Germans faced many problems at home, including corrupt rulers, high taxes, and a lack of available land, and Duden made the spacious expanse of Missouri plains sound very inviting to his fellow countrymen. By 1860, more than 38,000 Germans had settled in the lower Missouri River valley. German immigrants to Missouri are often called "followers of Duden." Duden died in 1856, and is buried in Bonn, Germany. In 1840, approximately 10 percent of the total heads of households in St. Charles County were German. This figure increased to 44 percent in 1850 and to 75 percent in 1870.

Many German immigrants were also attracted to the nearby towns of Hamburg and Howell. Historically, access to St. Charles County from other parts of the St. Louis metropolitan area had been difficult. It was reported in 1834 that it was not unusual to wait for up to six hours for a ferry to traverse the Missouri River from St. Louis County to St. Charles. A series of bridge collapses and failures also contributed to St. Charles County being separated from St. Louis.

In 1865, the first school opened in Weldon Spring and in 1874, the Emmanuel Evangelical Church was constructed. In 1888, the Oberle store opened for business. Many of the original structures constructed in the community are still standing. This early development is concentrated in the area immediately northeast of the I-64 and Highway 94 interchange. Growth in the community continued at a very slow pace. During World War II, a TNT munitions manufacturing plant was constructed off to the west of our community.

THE MEANING OF GREEN

Green is the color of hope, renewal and well-being. “Greenlight” is also a term commonly used to activate forward movement.
